I was amazed to see the Gulf of Mexico portion very clearly and I can put that in my log. The clouds came back and it was now well past 2:00 so I went back to bed.

On Thursday, we went down to Osoyoos and had a shower at the Husky Truck Stop. After several days in the dust at the top of Mt. Kobau, the \$7 for a shower is the best money you can spend. I have heard it said that technology


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
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
